

James Medhurst's Christmas Quiz 2016

There are three parts this year. The first part is a straightforward quiz, which consists of fifty general knowledge questions. The second and third parts require puzzle-solving skills as well as knowledge.

Teamwork is encouraged. Looking things up on the internet is discouraged, especially for Part 1, but it might be necessary if you get stuck, especially for Part 2. And cheating too early makes it less fun!

Part 2

The fifty answers can now be sorted into six unequal sized categories, in which four of the categories contain five answers each, and the other two categories contain fifteen answers each. The same fifty answers can also be sorted into five equal sized themes containing ten answers each. The categories and themes should intersect with one another so that the answers fit into the grid on the next page.

For example, only one of the fifty answers will fit into both category 1 and theme 1, while there will be three answers which can fit into both category 5 and theme 1, and so on, until every box is filled.

It should be apparent that most of the fifty answers are people, so a good place to start is to look at those answers which are not people, from which it should be possible to find at least two categories.

Once some of the categories and themes have been identified, it may be possible to answer more of the general knowledge questions, which in turn may help with the remaining categories and themes.

When all eleven of the categories and themes have been found, it will be time to move onto Part 3.

Part 3

Below is a seemingly random jumble of 90 characters (including both the letter "O" and a zero ("0")):

The names of the five themes identified in Part 2 can be removed from this jumble, although some of them will have to be modified for this to be possible. This will leave just 37 characters remaining.

The 37 remaining characters can then be rearranged, in order to reveal a hidden seasonal message.
